Romans 7:1-25 | Week 8 | 3/23/2014

- 1. What is the main point of the illustration in verses 1-3? What twist does the application of this illustration have in verse 4?
- 2. How is the "new marriage" different? (v. 6) Why did we need this new relationship?
- 3. Why is it necessary to know that the law is good and sin is bad? (vv. 7, 12, 13)
- 4. In 7b 11 Paul tells the story of his non-Christian past. How does Paul describe himself?
- 5. What happens when the law comes into contact with an unbeliever who is "under sin?" (vv. 7-11)
- 6. How does the law stir us up to sin more? (v. 8)
- 7. Can you relate to Christopher Ash's allegory about sin? (see below)
- 8. In verses 14-25 Paul moves from the past tense into the present tense. What positive things does he say about himself as a Christian in the present tense?
- 9. What negative things does he say?
- 10. How can these both be true at the same time?
- 11. What does it feel like to be a Christian with the heart desire to do the will of God? Compare your experiences before and after you became a Christian.
- 12. Have you ever been discouraged by sin and failure in your life? How does this chapter encourage you to respond? (v. 24, 25)
- 13. What is Paul looking forward to in verse 25a? (see 5:9, 10; 8:23; 13:11)
- 14. Pray.

But when 'the commandment' enters the room and says in a loud voice to the man that he must kill the monster 'sin.' What happens?
